# Theme – Painting with Light Judge – Aliah Jan

Hello everyone,

Thank you for inviting me to judge your very interesting theme for this month "Painting withLight". Just a quick introduction of myself for members who do not know who I am. I am Aliah and have been living in NZ for the last 11 years. I come from Malaysia and worked in television broadcasting before. I am a member of the Photographic Society of NZ and have been one of their panel judges for 10 years now. This month's theme is an interesting one and when Geoff invited me to judge this, I had just signed up with a photographer to learn some of his techniques playing with light and photographing using various light source, equipment and setups. Some more complex than others and some involving expensive equipment and some just a \$2.00 neon lightlight or party sticks. I did have a play but not enough to produce a portfolio of images unfortunately.

The overall collection of images submitted for me to judge shows a good variety and different ways you have used for the theme.

Understanding artificial lighting whether using a modeling or strobe light in the studio or the good old flash gun or using any other light source including even the smartphone these days, I believe involved playing.

Yes, the ability to play and want to explore the possibilities. Then, getting the techniques right by practicing and fine tuning to try achieve the results you wish and then go back toplay again. Because I believe it is also through play that we are bolder to experiment and to explore further. The "What else can I do?" often gives you surprising results that couldbe your next award winning image.

I have judged the images as they were presented, with the help of the titles of the images. My goal is to see if you have achieved what you had intended to with your image with the help of your title. I want to see that story that you wish to tell me with your image.

My personal preference to any genre of photography does not play a role in any of my judging. When I look at your image, I tend to look for the story from the image. In general, there will also be those images that mystifies more than others. Some images grab your attention visually but also emotionally. These images usually have a strong content value in its presentation coupled with interesting compositions and with successful use of light in the image.

Photography is about how we can capture the light of that moment we are recording and this element plays a significant role in whether the image is a WOW image or not.

The images I awarded Honours tonight would have successfully interpreted the theme with, strong subject/stories, and appropriate image processing (if that was used) to add tothe overall look and feel of the images.

Many of the other accepted images would have the following in the imagery

- Strong story/subject content
- Appropriate composition or lines
   The lighting of the image
   The holding power of the image

Here are my comments on the images as presented and they are in no particular order.



#### **A GRADE**

#### Black Illuminated

I must admit I am little baffled with this particular image. I am not quite sure how this image was produced, whether this image was captured first and then post processed with painting in the light effects using a software. I apologise that I am not quite sure. Because the rules does not say such a process is not acceptable, I have accepted this image. (GEOFF- If this is a painted in image instead of a captured image, I would not accept this. Perhaps you need find out and help with the final decision. Thank you.)

## Robbo






## Fire Ice

## **Graffiti Tree**

An interesting concept but not executed quite successfully. I would suggest to the photographer to darken the background on the left and also on the right because the eyes will tend to go to these two bright areas in the image. This is also because there is lacking in details on the dark tree trunk. The graffiti would have been better if there was more of the red light painting. Do go back to this nice big tree and try again. I have Not Accepted this image.

Another thing you could do, if you are going to use a long exposure is to use a Neutral Density Filter like ND6 or ND8 or even an ND10. It does help cut away light and helpful with long exposures.



This is compositionally better if I compared this to Glow Stick Glory. Again, there is a good balance of colour in the overall image. This is a Highly Commended image.




## **Night Tractors**

We must remember to watch out for bright areas in images especially when that is not where you want the eyes to focus on. Having said that, I still believe this was successfully execute and I have awards this an Honours as it is a rather successful lighting painting image.

# **Waiting For Morning**

Compositionally this image works but it is not as strong as Boats in the Night. I compare these two images because they have the similar subject and scene. Perhaps those shapes might look a little more spooky if it wasn't as bright. I have Accepted this image.

I wonder if the subject was placed on the left hand side of the image would be better compositionally? Or add a little more background on the right side of the image. It is still a good attempt and the light on the steps is quite beautiful. I have given Merit this image.



# **B GRADE**

# Bling In a Thing

Helena

I see two different images here. The lighting on the glass and jewels as one and the light effect as another. I would suggest light painting with more interaction with the jewels to tella strong Bling story. The lighting on the glass could be improved with a more dramatic lighting instead of quite a flat direct lighting. I have not accepted this image.



## Hollywood

Like the mood of this image. The car would probably have benefited with a little more lighting on the right hand side to show off more of the car. Also there are some white dots on the bottom right of the image. They could be darken out as they do attract attention. I have Accepted this image.

Creepy and effective. It's an Honours for me. Try cropping in just a little more into the subject. Would probably look great at a head shot portrait!! Well done!



Overall, I do believe all the images have worked the theme of 'Painting with Light', some using more creative lighting effects than others but all they images did used artificial lighting of some sort, some with long exposure and others with flash or directional lighting.

Even when painting with light, our images should tell their own stories. For example, why was the light used that way? How has the light used enhanced the image? Is the colour balance? Does it work compositionally? All these basic guide to imagery should be included in the process of creation.
